

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

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The need

MHS

NHS Longterm Workforce Plan, June 2023.

Psychological professions to grow by 24,000 - 26,000 posts by 2037.

15,000 more psychological therapists and practitioners trained over next three years.



Expansion of psychologists, psychological therapists and psychological practitioners.













What are the psychological professions?



A career in the psychological professions is ideal for people interested in the workings of the mind and helping people with mental health and wellbeing.

- One in four adults and one in ten children experience mental illness
- The different roles help people to overcome a variety of different mental health problems from depression to bi-polar disorder
- NHS Talking Therapies for anxiety and depression (previously Improving Access to Psychological Therapies [IAPT]) initiative provides greater access to the talking therapies for the public.
- In some parts of the country, the NHS contracts with charities, such as Mind, Turning Point and Re-think to deliver these services.

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Psychology

the study of people: how they think, how they act, react and interact

concerned with all aspects of behaviour and the thoughts, feelings and motivation underlying such behaviour

Psychotherapy

conducted in several different ways such as individual, group, couple and family psychotherapy

can help people to overcome stress, emotional and relationship problems or troublesome habits

Psychiatry

the study of mental disorders and their diagnosis, management and prevention

psychiatrists are medical **doctors** who have qualified in psychiatry (see session on doctors)


What might I be able to do if I haven't got a degree?

Most psychological professions jobs in the NHS are covered by the Agenda for Change (AfC) pay scales.

Examples:

- Trainee psychologist band 6 (£37,338 -£44,962 per year)
- Assistant psychologist band 4 (£26,530 £29,114)
- Psychological well being practitioner -band 5 (£29,970 - £36,483 per year)
- Consultant psychologists Band 8c (£74,290 -£85,601 per year)



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Professional registration



Professional registration with the HCPC relates only to practice as a psychologist in England.

- 9 protected titles include 'practitioner psychologist', 'clinical psychologist'
- In order to work as a practitioner psychologist in the UK, registrants **must** meet set standards and be registered with the HCPC

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PWPs, EMHPs and CWPs have to register with either the BABCP or BPS





Voluntary registers exist for some psychotherapists and counsellors (eg with the Association of Child Psychotherapists – accredited by the Professional Standards Authority)

And clinical associate psychologists (CAPs) can now register with the BPS

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Financial support for students training in the psychological professions

- There is no NHS funding available for students studying for degrees in psychology general student finance options apply
- Some of the training for psychological therapies takes place in a **paid trainee role** (eg PWP, HIT, Education Mental Health Practitioner, Children's Wellbeing Practitioner, Mental health and wellbeing practitioner)
- Local NHS organisations fund clinical psychology postgraduate training applications are through a central clearing house, based in Leeds
- Graduates taking professional training in other areas of psychology or psychotherapy will usually need to fund themselves
- The NHS offers a limited number of **child psychotherapy** training posts which are offered by a small number of NHS trusts, or as a partnership between an NHS trust and one of the training providers.
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Financial support for healthcare students



NHS Learning Support Fund

Training grant of £5,000 per year for eligible students studying nursing, midwifery and many allied health profession pre-registration courses.

Other elements of the fund for eligible students include:

- £2,000 parental support
- £1,000 specialist subject payment (students studying mental health nursing, learning disability nursing, radiography, podiatry, prosthetics and orthotics, orthoptics)
- Help towards travel and accommodation costs for placements
- Exceptional support fund

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


Course finder
